

22-23. Any two of the following: Dust storms, blizzards, grasshoppers, fires, tornados, hail, wild animals, drought

24-25. Two of the following three challenges: Loneliness was one challenge, because people moved far away from their families and the homesteads were very spread apart. Diseases and a lack of medical care was a challenge because if someone got sick or hurt, they may not be able to contact a doctor and therefore might die from a treatable ailment. A lack of spiritual guidance in the form of pastors or churches made it difficult for families to properly perform religious ceremonies at events such as birth, marriage, and death.

26. The Dawes Act

27-28. No. Native communities did not understand land ownership in the same way as white people and so many Native Americans did not want a homestead. The land offered to natives was sub-par and could not sufficiently support a family through agriculture.
